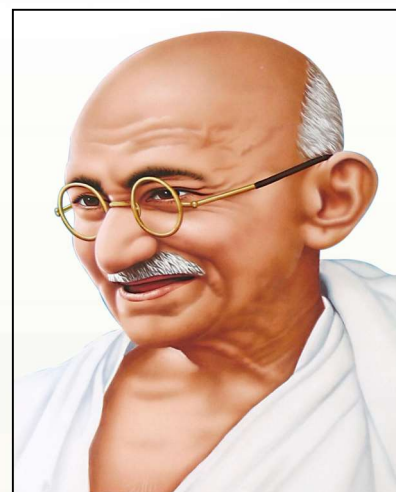

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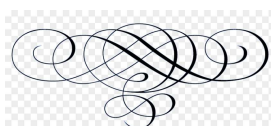
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Section A: DEI

From the Coordinator's desk

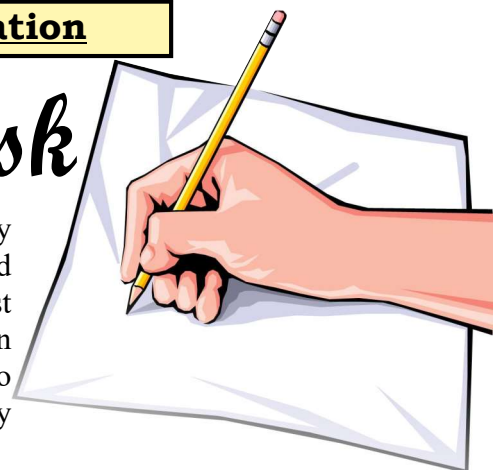
The centres of the Distance Education Programme of DEI across the country and abroad have been celebrating Deepavali day as Innovation, Quality and Valuation Day since the year 2013 as per Guidance provided by the Most Revered Prof. P.S. Satsangi Sahab, Chairman of Advisory Committee on Education (ACE). As the event enters its tenth year, we express our gratitude to the organizing team of DEI and the e-transmission team for this extremely useful and student–beneficial annual event.

This year the event was organized on October 24, 2022 (Deepavali day) in the early hours of the morning in the Agroecology farms of Dayalbagh during the field work with the theme being 'The Role of Spiritual Values in building holistic personality'. A brief report of the celebration appears in Section 'A' of this newsletter.

I will like to highlight only two observations made by the Chief Guest Shri S. Naiyer Ali Nazmi, Principal Commissioner Income Tax, Agra in his talk, which was outstanding: (i) 'Education is a tool to learn spiritual and moral values and internalize them', and (ii) 'Moral and Spiritual values-driven social sensibility brings open-mindedness and acceptance of people...' Gracious Huzur was pleased to compliment him stating that '.....I must congratulate the learned speaker for giving excellent concepts for us to emulate....'

There are only a few publications that talk of spiritual values and these are rarely included in the list of values that students must imbibe. An interesting publication by two Russian authors on 'Spirituality and Moral Values' [1] takes too broad a view of what spiritual values are, but makes the following noteworthy observations:

- (i) The publication starts with a quotation that states that one must gain a state of spirituality because, in a time of testing, morality seems to be lost.



- (ii) The authors place 'conscience' on a very high pedestal as a spiritual value stating that conscience is the voice of God within us' and 'conscience determines man's spiritual world and culture'.

Against this backdrop, it is noteworthy that Most Revered Prof. P.S. Satsangi Sahab, during a meeting with some foreign delegates who had come to attend the 4 – day Dayalbagh Science of Consciousness conference starting on the next day, told them that “our conscience keeps us on the right track” and then put forward the concept of “conscience-based consciousness”, which has to be put into action to perceive reality and ultimately achieve perfection through hard work, fulfilling duties and cultivating the habit of not giving up”. The concept was highly appreciated by the delegates.

Mindset for Sustainability and Pro-Climate Action- Lessons from Dayalbagh

Human behaviours and lifestyles have left long-term cumulative influences on the sustainability of ecological systems. In general, there has been overwhelming attention and significance attached to technological solutions for climate/sustainability promotion while less attention has been given to pro-climate behavioural transformation. However, it is behaviour- centric approach at the level of individual, family, and community as recommended by psychological and behavioural sciences, which can be a starting point for any behavioural transformation to take place. For humans to effectively cope and adapt to the changing climate scenario, they need to alter their mindsets and lifestyles as behavioural transformation plays a key role to ensure global well-being.

For ensuring the well-being of the planet as well as its habitants, we have to move from '*wanting change*' to actually '*working for change*'- from the jungles of concrete to the lush green jungles; from the competitive race for unsustainable consumables to the peaceful collaboration in sharing resources; and the web of materialism to the altar of spiritualism. A live demonstration of all the above is Dayalbagh, the temple of learning, and DEI, our alma mater. Extending compassionate care to inhabitants of planet earth is an integral part of sustainable behaviour. Although sustainability is not always cost-centric for people as well as corporate organizations, there are numerous long-term returns (tangible as well as intangible) attached to it. Following the Dayalbagh Eco-village model, and hence, the effective adoption of Sustainable Development Goals (SDGs) by all individuals, societies, and nations can largely help in the mitigation of climate change.

A positive, pro-climate, and sustainability oriented mindset and action (even if it means sacrificing some of the luxuries of life) is desirable at the global level for which mass efforts of social scientists around the globe are needed. Multidisciplinary approaches integrating natural and social sciences are warranted in this regard, to give policymakers an insight into the various behavioural challenges and barriers in order to fortify policies for climate change and sustainability. A people-centric effort at the micro level conjoined with

community-based actions under the umbrella of a positive belief system and spirituality is the need of the hour. This would prepare people to cope with any adverse scenario efficiently. Moreover, it would act as a buffer by providing a good port network in case of any climatic adversity. Learning to compromise with many of our behavioural choices and actions in order to fit in the 'new normal' of COVID-19 made us realize that sustainability-linked choices may give us a desirable edge over common perception-based behaviour. Large scale adoption of such behavioural choices can, in turn, inspire, push and motivate a good number of people to inculcate best behavioural practices for managing climate change and sustainability as being widely practised in Dayalbagh.

Wayfaring to Self-Discovery

Studying Theology at DEI was an invested exercise. I have been a student of History of Religion for decades now and, a teacher of Ancient Indian Studies at Lady Shri Ram College, University of Delhi. While studying the context of the emergence of religious traditions and their enduring impact, I would often wonder what sustained its appeal to the masses, intellectuals, and the spiritually evolved. Its relationship/ compatibility with the discipline of science was equally worthy of deeper exploration. Then came a chance to study it at the PG Diploma level at DEI, in 2013. I took it up as a soul-searching task, curious to seek answers to endless queries; both academic and personal in nature.



The program was wide-based. There was a chance to study numerous religious traditions around the world and mull over the impulse of their genesis along with their social location. What became clear was that human connect with the mystical has been there since the origin of humanity. The pull towards the higher powers was always there and human beings evolved their own diverse ways to tap it; some succeeding in traversing a part of the long path towards it while others continuing their attempt.

Does God really exist? How can one prove that? What is the Ultimate Truth? Can science beat religion in its search for the Ultimate Truth? Can religious philosophy be universal in its appeal and transmission? Is intuition just a mystical idea or is there a scientific basis to it? These were the queries that bothered me and prompted me to further my research as I decided to complete my Masters in Theology from the same institute in 2021. Though I cannot claim to have found all answers to my questions, what became clear to me was that the paths on which science and religion tread are the same. Religion can be very experiential but it also holds potential for experimentality too. Here I am not really referring to the paraphernalia associated with religion, that is, its myths, rituals, or its societal contours but to its spiritual essence and consciousness.

The inner evolutionary process associated especially with the 'Sant' tradition allows one to experience changes within oneself and more important, tabulate those. These can be recorded and studied scientifically but before that comes the recognition that one's own body and mind are the laboratories for these experiments. I also sensed that within the human frame existed apertures that can connect one to higher planes, with a degree of meditational practices. The study of Theology also pushed me into thinking that acknowledgment of the truth that humanity is connected at a sublime plane might actually resolve many mundane problems created by human greed and avarice. The world is in need of resolutions to the growing chaos; theological awareness about the existence of a superior guiding force can really help, provided it comes from a genuine desire to better our lot and a willingness to change accordingly. The course on Theology actually filled me with the hope that a better world can be created where diversity can be recognized along with unity in thought and cooperation in action.
