DEI Delegation Bags Two Prizes at the Inter-University National Youth Festival





The student delegation of Dayalbagh Educational Institute (Deemed to be University), Agra-282005 achieved remarkable success at the 37th Inter-University National Youth Festival, held at Punjab Agricultural University, Ludhiana, from March 28th to April 1st, 2024. This prestigious event, named "Hunar: Harvesting National Talent," witnessed participation from universities nationwide. DEI students showcased their talents in three key events: Western Group Song, On-the-Spot Photography, and Mehandi. While the Western Group Song performance earned a commendation from the organizers, the DEI participants secured the Second place in both the On-the-Spot Photography and Mehandi competitions. Astuti Gogia, a student of Drawing & Painting Department, Faculty of Arts, excelled in Onthe-Spot Photography, while Muskaan, also from the same Department, displayed her talent in the Mehndi competition. Their achievements are particularly significant as they competed against participants from 117 universities across the country. The journey to success began with DEI students' outstanding performance at the Zonal Level competitions held in January 2024. Their victory at the Zonal Level secured their spot at the National Youth Festival. At the National Level, they continued to impress, ultimately bringing home two trophies.

Dayalbagh Educational Institute and University of Waterloo extend Educational and Scientific Cooperation

Dayalbagh Educational Institute(Deemed to be University), Dayalbagh, Agra-282005 and the University of Waterloo, Canada, have renewed and reinforced nearly sixty years of relationship that was first formalized in July 2008 through the signing of a collaborative agreement. Short-Term Capacity Building Programme on Organizational Behaviour and Life Skills Organized





The Association of Indian Universities-Dayalbagh Educational Institute-Academic and Administrative Development Centre (AIU-DEI-AADC) organized a Short-Term Capacity Building Programme on 'Organizational Beahaviour and Life Skills leading to Better Worldliness' in association with ICT Continuing Education Centre, Dayalbagh Educational Institute (Deemed to be University), Dayalbagh, Agra-282005 from 26th February 2024 to 2nd March 2024. The main goal of this endeavour was to develop an awareness and understanding of Soft Skills or Life Skills that are the foundation of Organizational Behaviour and its ensuing success, thereby leading to Better Worldliness.

Mr. Anoop Srivsatava, Vice President, Dayalbagh Ra Dha Sva Aa Mi Satsang Sabha, and Former Additional Director General (Railway Protection Force) was the Inaugural Speaker. From the Coordinator's desk

Dayalbagh Educational Institute (Deemed-to-be University) launched its Distance Education Programme on 2nd June 2004 in the blended education mode, i.e. as a blend of traditional instruction and e-education. The e-education experience proved to be very rewarding when the Covid-19 pandemic struck India in the summer of the year 2020 and we were able to make a smooth transition to on-line education and later on, when we decided to switch over to the five UGC-entitled degree-level programmes in the online mode in the session 2021-22.



All of us are aware of the tremendous benefit that has come about from the introduction of e-Satsang. But some may not be aware of what came to light from a report that Prof. Gursaran, Dean of ICT Centre, Soami Nagar, New Delhi mailed to me, which is reproduced below:

The evolution of e-Satsang has its origin in the Launch of the Distance Education Programme of the Dayalbagh Educational Institute at Melathiruvenkatanathapuram (Tamil Nadu) on June 2, 2004. In that programme, a novel two-way transmission between MTV Puram and Dayalbagh took place which gave the programme the status of being interactive. The Institute prayer was sung from Dayalbagh and transmitted to MTV Puram; inaugural speeches and the Holy Bachan of Gracious Huzur were transmitted to Dayalbagh; and finally, the Institute song was sung at Dayalbagh and transmitted to MTV Puram. Through Immense Grace, the launch was successful. The technologies employed were most rudimentary: audio was transmitted directly over a mobile phone line, and video images (one every 3 seconds) were transmitted through the Yahoo server (a third-party server).

Soon after the Launch programme was over, in a second function to mark the celebration of fifty years of the Tamil Radhasoami Satsang Association (also held at MTV Puram), Gracious Huzur was pleased to remark:

"The bold new experiment that we witnessed this morning is in fact a forerunner of Tele-education and Tele-Satsang or as you might call it as e-education and e-Satsang i.e., electronic education and electronic Satsang. We had the full view of Sanctum Sanctorum of Radhasoami Satsang at Dayalbagh during the morning function and the Holy Singhasan, the most sacred Singhasan of Radhasoami Satsang with Param Guru Huzur Dr. Lal Sahab enthroned thereon was an exhilarating experience for all Satsangis gathered here this morning."

Thus the term "e-Satsang" was born. Ever since, through Immense Grace, Satsangis all over the world have been Blessed with the opportunity of having *Darshan* and hearing Holy *Bachans* live, sitting in the remotest of Satsang Halls, while e-Satsang Teams have been granted a rare and special opportunity for *seva*. The birth and spread of e-Satsang has been no doubt a turning point in the history of Satsang. No one imagined that e-Satsang would grow at such a breathtaking pace from its birth in MTV Puram with a small experiment, to today's 160-station Cascade network.....

After the Launch of e-Satsang on June 2, 2004, a second experiment was performed on June 7, 2004, from Kakinada. The Satsang was once again interactive with Dayalbagh, with the Satsang proceedings from Kakinada being transmitted to Dayalbagh, and the Ladies' path from Dayalbagh being transmitted to Kakinada. A few days later, on 10th June 2005, atop a serene and sacred hilltop in Rajaborari where Huzur Sahabji Maharaj once used to sit, Gracious Huzur was pleased to Proclaim that the next e-Satsang transmissions would go directly to New York and London. It was a Mandate that foretold the beginning of the evolution of e-Satsang.

We consider it a Blessing that the Distance Education Programme of DEI had a role in the evolution of e-Satsang. Presently, we have 484 ± 1 e-Satsang centres located across our planet Earth. We are hopeful that they will host our programmes in the coming years.



Education 5.0 and Its Implementation

1. Evolution of Education

The evolution of education over the past years has been considered in a recent publication [1] in terms of Education 1.0 to Education 5.0 using the following schematic representation:



It has also been pointed out in this publication [1] that Education 5.0 tries to address the following shortcomings of Education 4.0:

- (i) Lack of accessibility Education 4.0 depends heavily on technology and the Internet, which can create barriers for disadvantaged students,
- (ii) Human interaction which is essential for developing social and emotional skills, is considerably reduced due to the high use of technology, and
- (iii) Over-reliance on technology creates a situation when students become so highly dependent on technology to learn that they begin to lack the skills to learn independently.

Education 5.0 aims to address these shortcomings by creating a more inclusive and equitable education system that uses technology to enhance human interaction and promote independent learning, for example, by focusing on developing an interdisciplinary approach to learning, integrating different fields of study, and fostering more collaboration between students and teachers.

Education 5.0 aims to promote personalized learning, collaboration, and well-being and to develop 21st Century skills such as critical thinking, creativity and problem-solving.

2. <u>Implementation of Education 5.0</u>

Another interesting publication [2] dealing with the implementation of Education 5.0 in developed and developing countries, gives useful information.

Saudi Arabia and Malaysia, where Education 5.0 is being implemented successfully, were

selected as the developed countries while Zimbabwe and Sri Lanka were selected as the developing countries.

Developed countries have established the rules and regulations at the highest level in the Ministry of Education, industry, and business. The focus is on identifying the key obstacles at any level and bridging the gap for sustainable and reliable advancement in the education sector. Developing countries need to conduct more scientific research to observe and assess the current situation at all levels to propose different new ideas based on evidence-based study outcomes.

Study results revealed that restructuring the overall education process needs to frame rules and regulations to make the education environment more organized. This is particularly needed in developing countries.

Developed countries are providing ample financial resources for the development of the higher education sector to meet the market needs and demands as they believe this is the backbone of the country's future prospects in terms of economic and industrial growth. The investment made by developing countries in education, on the other hand, is rather low.

From the Editor's desk

The articles in this issue are a tribute to one of the most magnificent creatures on our planet—Elephants. Empathetic, sensitive and extremely intelligent, their absence would be devastating not just to humans but entire ecosystems which rely on them. Today threatened by environmental degradation, habitat loss and poaching, the Asian elephant has been listed as endangered on the IUCN (Internation Union for Conservation of Nature) Red List. *Elephant Whisperers*, which won the 2022 Academy Award for Best Documentary Short Film is a powerful depiction of the close bond between elephants and their caretakers. The film highlights the challenges faced by those who work towards elephant conservation and with deep love and commitment care for orphaned or injured calves.

Trunks through Time

One look at one of God's most majestic, graceful and intelligent creations and one cannot help but ask in wonder -- where did they come from? With a history spanning millions of years, elephants began their evolutionary journey over 60 million years ago with small, dog-sized ancestors called Moeritherium. Over time, they developed their iconic long trunks—a versatile tool crucial for survival.



Around 25 million years ago, these ancestors diversified into species like mastodons and mammoths, eventually leading to today's African and Asian elephant emerging 5 to 10 million years ago.

Elephants can very well be hailed as 'Engineers of the Ecosystem'. As the largest land animal on Earth, they play a pivotal role in shaping the landscapes they inhabit. Their presence reverberates through the ecosystem, creating a delicate balance that supports a diverse array of plant and animal life. These gentle giants act as ecosystem engineers, transforming their habitats by uprooting trees, creating "elephant lawns," and digging waterholes that become a vital source of water in times of drought. Elephant dung, a rich source of nutrients, promotes plant growth and supports a thriving community of insects and micro-organisms. Their role as seed dispersers helps regenerate forests and maintain plant diversity. Without elephants, ecosystems can become overgrown, leading to loss of biodiversity and food sources for other animals.

Only three species of elephants are found in the whole world! There are three recognized species of elephants in the world, each with distinct characteristics and habitats. The African Bush Elephant (Loxodonta Africana) is the largest land animal on Earth, native to sub-Saharan Africa with its large size, long tusks, and distinctively shaped ears. The African Forest Elephant (Loxodonta cyclotis) is smaller and found in the dense rainforests of central and western Africa, with straighter tusks and smaller ears adapted to their habitat. The Asian Elephant (Elephas maximus) is smaller than its African counterparts, found across Asia with distinctive twin-domed heads and one finger-like projection at the end of their trunks.

Which species is India home to? There are four recognized subspecies of Asian elephants, each with distinct characteristics and habitats. The Indian Elephant (Elephas maximus indicus) is widely found across the Indian subcontinent, known for its relatively small size and large ears. The Sri Lankan Elephant (Elephas maximus maximus) is smaller and exclusive to Sri Lanka. The Sumatran Elephant (Elephas maximus sumatranus) is one of the smallest subspecies, found in Sumatra's dense forests and the Borneo Pygmy Elephant (Elephas maximus borneensis) is adapted to the forests of Borneo.

How do Elephant Families Work? Elephants, known for their intricate social structures, form close-knit family units led by a matriarch. These wise leaders guide their offspring, while herds share strong bonds. Young females learn crucial caretaking skills, preparing for their future roles as mothers. Male elephants, leading more solitary lives, may join female herds during mating season or form loose associations with other males. Communication, through vocalizations and gestures, is vital, reflecting their empathy and cooperation. In times of danger, they unite, forming protective circles.

The Asian elephant is classified as an endangered species on the International Union for Conservation of Nature (IUCN) Red List. India is home to the largest population of wild Asian elephants in Asia, yet their survival faces threats such as habitat loss and fragmentation due to rapid deforestation for agriculture and development. Human-elephant conflict (HEC) poses a serious challenge, leading to crop raiding, property damage, and loss of lives on both sides. Poaching, though not as widespread, remains a threat to elephants due to the demand for ivory. India has implemented various conservation initiatives, including protected areas like the Nilgiri Biosphere Reserve and Kaziranga National Park, and measures to mitigate HEC such as elephant-proof trenches and wildlife corridors. Community-based conservation projects are also underway, engaging local communities and providing alternative livelihoods. The enduring bond between elephants and humans, seen in cultural practices like temple elephants, underscores the need to protect these magnificent creatures and their habitats. Collaboration between government, conservation groups, communities, and citizens is essential to secure a future where elephants continue to thrive in India's forests, embodying the spirit of the wild for generations to come.

Elephant Whisperers, the 2022 Academy Winner Documentary: A Review

Set in the heart of Tamil Nadu's Mudumalai Tiger Reserve, Elephant Whisperers is a 40-minute documentary that chronicles a pure and poignant bond between a devoted indigenous couple, Bomman and Bellie and an orphaned elephant, Raghu. Bomman is a mahout who comes from a long line of elephant handlers and has inherited his father's expertise in reuniting abandoned baby elephants with their herds. The couple's decision to take in Raghu is a profound commitment to nurturing and protecting a vulnerable animal in need. Through their selfless dedication and unwavering care, they create a sanctuary of love and belonging.

The documentary is a tapestry woven with threads of emotional moments, each one stirring the viewers' hearts with a profound mixture of joy, sadness and compassion. The scenes entailing Raghu's recovery from the injury and his return to good health under the watchful gaze of his caregivers are very heartwarming. Equally touching are the scenes where Raghu expresses his love for Bomman, while he bathes and feeds him with care. Raghu is soon joined by another baby elephant, Ammu, who is also an orphan. Raghu seems to act an older sibling to Ammu, who exudes a playful energy and a curiosity about the world around her. The viewers witness a deep bond developing between the two elephants, bringing newfound purpose, joy and fulfillment in the lives of Bomman and Bellie. The documentary ends with the Forest Department taking Raghu away from the close-knit family to hand him over to a new caregiver. As Raghu is led away, Bomman and Bellie are left heart broken. In a tender scene captured by the camera, Ammu wipes away the tears that trickle down Bellie's weathered cheeks with a gentle touch of her trunk. The documentary is replete with such moving episodes, where each scene unfolds with a delicate balance of emotion.

Against the backdrop of encroaching development and environmental degradation, the film serves as a poignant reminder of the urgent need to coexist harmoniously with the natural world and protect its most vulnerable inhabitants. With breathtaking cinematography, the film invites viewers to experience the magic of this extraordinary tale firsthand.
