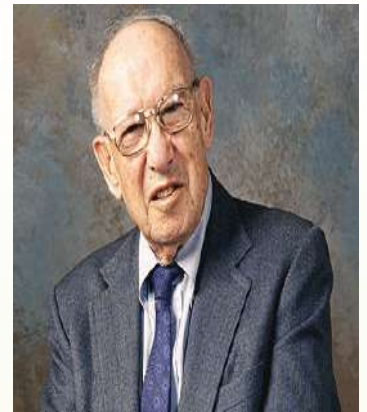

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## Section A : DEI

### 77<sup>th</sup> Independence Day Celebrated at DEI



The 77<sup>th</sup> Independence Day was celebrated with profuse enthusiasm at Dayalbagh Educational Institute (Deemed to be University), Dayalbagh, Agra. Prof. Prem Kumar Kalra, Director, DEI, was the Chief Guest on the occasion. He hoisted the National Flag and received the Guard of Honour. Thereafter, on the scintillating tunes of the DEI Band, a magnificent March Past began in which contingents from various schools, colleges, and faculties of DEI participated with tremendous vigour and solemnity. The melodious rendering of a patriotic song by a group of DEI students and the National Flag flying in the sky through a Drone intensified patriotic zeal in the gathering.

In his address, Prof. Kalra spoke about the true meaning of Independence Day and the achievements of Dayalbagh Educational Institute. He emphasized the need to identify new dimensions and definitions of freedom in accordance with the changing circumstances and concurrent problems and contexts. He also inspired the students to play an active role in solving the problems of society in general and the world at large. In the March Past Competition, DEI Prem Vidyalaya Girls' Inter College and DEI Technical College were awarded Winning Shields. Apart from this, Special prizes were given to the members of the Contingents of DEI Nursery and Play Centre, DEI PV Primary School, and Saran Ashram School. Under the aegis of the 'Meri Mati Mera Desh' Nation-wide Campaign, a Clay Sculpture-Making Competition was organized by the National Service Scheme Unit of DEI and the winning participants of this competition were also rewarded on this occasion. Diksha Singh and Reena Verma (Arts Faculty) and Nihar Satsangi (Science Faculty) stood First, Second, and Third respectively in this competition. Tree plantation was also organized to mark the befitting end of the Independence Day Events, in which, Engineer Jamuna Prasad, Member, Academic Council of DEI, and Dr Ashok Sahai, Medical Officer, Saran Ashram Hospital, Dayalbagh, planted saplings.

On this occasion, Prof. Anand Mohan, the Registrar of the Institute, Treasurer of the Institute, Smt. Sneh Bijlani, Deans of all the Faculties, Principals of DEI Schools, Heads of departments besides other staff members of the Institute were present along with a large gathering of DEI students.

### Report on Activities Conducted at (i-c-n-c-) TALL



With the Grace and Blessings of the Supreme Lord, iNFORMATION-cOMMUNICATION-nEURO-cOGNITIVE Technologies Assisted Language Lab (i-c-n-c-) TALL organized a session on "Interaction in Devbhasha Sanskrit" with the delegation from North America and the students of DEI on July 11, 2023.

More than 40 learners participated in this interaction session. The programme commenced with the Institute Prayer in Sanskrit - '*Hey Dayalu Sada Kripalu*'. Dr. Bani Dayal Dhir, Coordinator (i-c-n-c-) TALL, gave a captivating presentation highlighting the facilities and initiatives of (i-c-n-c-) TALL in disseminating the glory of Sanskrit language. Dr. Madhulika Nemani, Coordinator of Sanskrit language programmes in Atlanta (USA), apprised the audience about the initiatives being taken in North America by Atlanta & Satsang Culture Development Centre (SCDC) team in collaboration with the faculty members of the DEI Sanskrit Department to promote Sanskrit language. Prof Meera Sharma, Emeritus Professor, Department of Sanskrit, DEI motivated all to learn Sanskrit. The Interaction Session was facilitated by Prof. Meera Sharma, Dr. Bani Dayal Dhir, and Dr. Shobha Bharadwaj.



(i-c-n-c-) TALL also organized a Ten-day Summer Workshop on Spoken Sanskrit for the students of DEI Prem Vidyalaya Girls' Inter College from June 7 to 16, 2023. Students were taught nuances of Sanskrit language with practical sessions in conversation in Sanskrit. Dr. Bani Dayal Dhir, Coordinator (i-c-n-c-) TALL, apprised the participants of Sanskrit learning software and other digital tools available at TALL. The Workshop was successfully conducted by Prof. Meera Sharma and Dr. Shobha Bhardwaj of Department of Sanskrit, DEI.



A Crash Course on Spoken English was organized for class XI and XII students of DEI Prem Vidyalaya Girls' Inter College and REI Inter College from May 22 to June 6, 2023. Some students of Technical College First- year also joined. The Course was conducted with the active support of (i-c-n-c-) TALL where interactive sessions were held. Students participating in the Course used the Wordsworth Language System to practise various English language structures. The software is extremely interactive, helping students to identify their mistakes and improve. The Course was made even more interesting through audio-visuals like Screening of Films, Episodes from Discovery Channel, etc. The performance of the students was evaluated, and the sessions held at the lab went a long way in making the Course a success.

## **ICT Continuing Education Centre, DEI: Success Stories**

Two trainees of the DEI SSB ([Service Selection Board](#)) Training Programme, Prachi Yadav and Sanjana Chahar of Electrical Engineering, Faculty of Engineering, Dayalbagh Educational Institute, 2019-23 Batch, have cleared the Defense Entrance Exams in AFCAT ([Air Force Common Admission Test](#)) and CDS ([Combined Defence Service](#)) 2022-23.

Prachi was also selected through NAVY TECH and recently, SSCW (Short Service Commission for Women). She was recommended in April 2023 in Bhopal after passing the CDS exam. Then again, in June, she appeared through the direct technical entry for engineering students, from Bangalore, and got

Both young ladies with their great determination along with the guidance from DEI SSB Training Programme, have successfully qualified for Services Selection Board (SSB) in their 3<sup>rd</sup> and 4<sup>th</sup> attempts respectively.

#### School News:

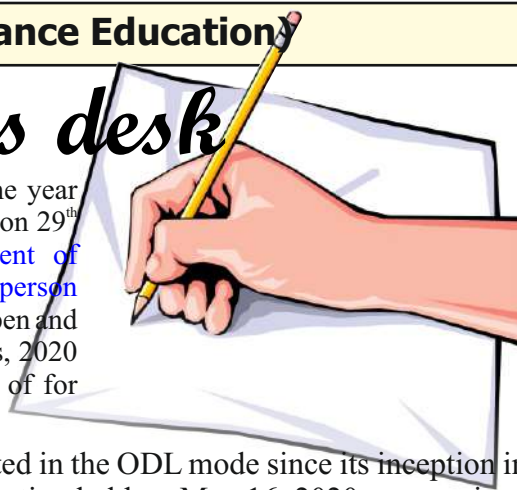
A workshop on 'Python Coding Language' was held in DEI FAB LAB from May 22 to 28, 2023, for students from class 6 to class 12 ([which will be extended to Class 5 to Class 12 in December, 2023](#)) to give them hands-on lab experience. In this workshop, students learned the basics of Python language and Plotting Graphs, Image Editing, etc. by using Python.

**Students' Achievements:** Jiyanishi Satsangi of class 9 has qualified for the second-level International Mathematics Olympiad. She performed excellently by securing the 563<sup>rd</sup> Zonal Rank. Ashna Suri of class 12 and Komal Gupta of class 11 have qualified for the second-level National Science Olympiad. Their excellent performance helped them secure the 62<sup>nd</sup> and the 308<sup>th</sup> Zonal Ranks respectively.

## Section B: DEI-ODE (Online & Distance Education)

### *From the Coordinator's desk*

Two significant developments in the field of higher education in the year 2020 were: (i) the launching of the National Education Policy (NEP) on 29<sup>th</sup> July, 2020, and (ii) the promulgation\* (\*the public announcement of something, especially a new law: Senior most professor does not mean person on the top of the seniority list) of the University Grants Commission (Open and Distance Learning Programmes and Online Programmes) Regulations, 2020 on 4<sup>th</sup> September, 2020. Both these documents had been taken note of for implementation by the relevant statutory body of DEI.



The Distance Education Programme of DEI was being conducted in the ODL mode since its inception in the year 2004. In a meeting of the Advisory Committee on Education held on May 16, 2020, we received Gracious Guidance to conduct our degree-level programmes in the online mode 'which in our case differs from other places in being supervised rather than managed by headquarters without the presence of supervisor at various locations'.

The UGC Regulations of September, 2020 on online programmes permitted HEIs with NAAC scores of 3.26 and above to start full-fledged online programmes without prior approval of the UGC and we opted for 3 UG degree level and 2 PG degree level UGC-entitled programmes. These were: B.Com (Hons), BBA, BA (Hons) Social Science, MA (Theology) and M.Com.

NEP 2020 has introduced considerable flexibility in the degree-level programmes, as described below:

#### Undergraduate (UG) Programmes

While earlier, the UG programmes were of 3-year duration, NEP – 2020 proposed two types of UG degree courses – of 3 or 4-year duration, with multiple exit options within this period, with the appropriate certification, e.g. a certificate after completing one year in a discipline or field including vocational professional areas or diploma after two years of study or a Bachelor's degree after a three-year programme. The four-year multidisciplinary Bachelor's programme, however, shall be the preferred option since it allows the opportunity to experience the full range of holistic and multidisciplinary education.

#### Post-graduate (PG) Programmes

While earlier, PG programmes were of 2-year duration, NEP – 2020, suggested three designs for Master's programme:

- For those who had successfully completed the three-year Bachelor's programme, a two-year Master's programme with the second year devoted entirely to research,
- For those who had completed a 4-year Bachelor's programme with research, a 1-year Master's programme, and
- There may be an integrated 5-year Bachelor's / Master's programme.

Undertaking a Ph.D shall require either a Master's degree or a 4-year Bachelor's degree with research. The M.Phil. programme shall be discontinued.

NEP 2020 also recommended the establishment of an Academic Bank of Credit as described below:

#### Academic Bank of Credit

The Academic Bank of Credit (ABC) is designed to digitally store the academic credits earned from various recognized HEIs so that the degrees from an HEI can be awarded taking into account credits earned. The 4-year programme may also lead to a degree with research if the student completes a rigorous research project in their major area(s) of study as specified by the HEI.

A considerable amount of preparatory work was done to develop the content for these programmes and to update our e-learning platform. Then after admitting students in the five programmes, they were all duly registered in the ABC and their results are also being deposited in the ABC.

## **D.E.I : Training Tribal Women for Entrepreneurship**

Dayalbagh Educational Institute (Deemed to be University) Agra, has been skilling students and women for the last few decades. The office of the commandant 02 Bn, CRPF, Sabari Nagar, Sukma, Chhattisgarh had contacted the officials of the Distance Education Programme (D.E.P) of the Institute with a request to skill around 30 highly backward and tribal women. This Unit has taken the initiative to train local tribal / non-tribal youths of this area to enable them for entrepreneurship and self-employment. [The proposal to conduct a 9-week Stand-alone module on Sewing Operations at their location was unanimously approved in a meeting of the Academic Council held on 14.09.2023.](#)

For this, a trained mentor having experience in teaching sewing for many years has been relocated to the area of Gadiras, Sukma under the guidance of the Programme Coordinator of the Course. After the appropriate admission process, the classes of the group (primarily consisting of tribal and OBC women) have been started from 25<sup>th</sup> July 2023 ([GEN-1,OBC-15,SC-1, and ST-9](#)).

The course content would include skilling of sewing garments which have adequate local usage and market. The content would equip women to produce high-quality, socially-acceptable, and marketable apparel. Training related to a sustainable market with a commitment to providing quality products will also be included. The course intends to not only skill the women but also to take them up to the level of setting up a social enterprise in such a remote location. This is an initiative to reach the last, the least, the lowest, and the lost [among Humankind](#). The attempt would sensitize the group of women and empower them towards financial independence.

I have found a magic lamp just like Alladin's but only better, for my lamp of knowledge would grant me as many wishes as I want all throughout my life.

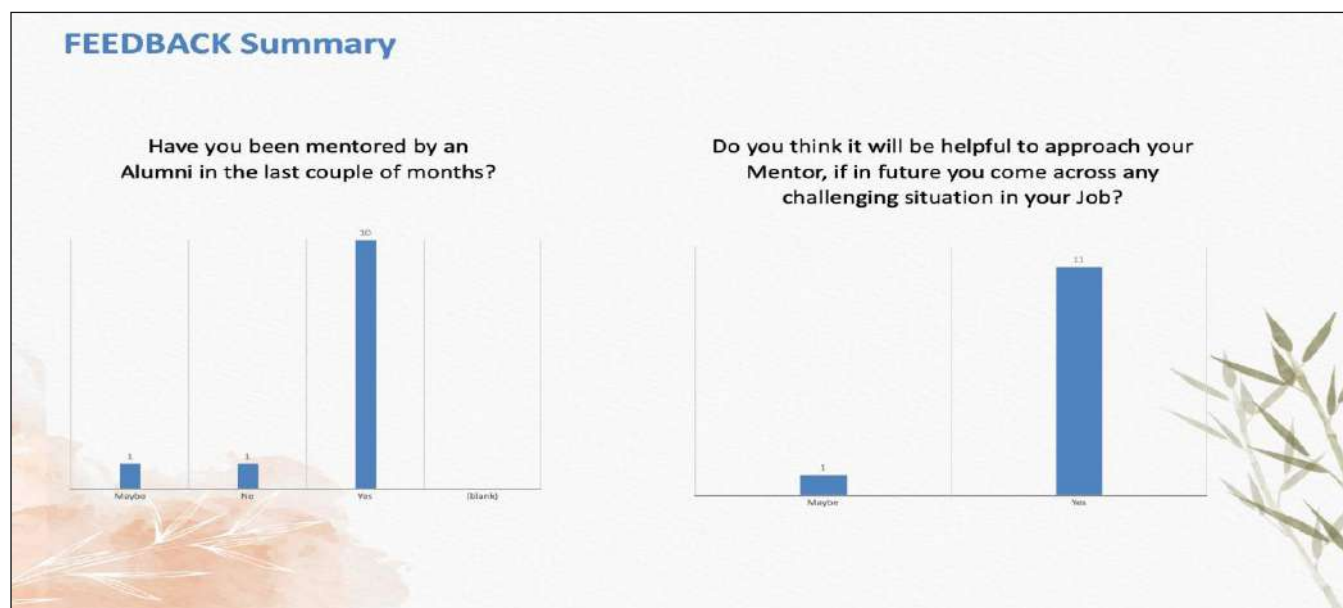
## Mentoring Excellence Program: Feedback Report

- No. of mentees registered for the program: 23
- No. of mentees who availed themselves of mentorship sessions: 17
- No. of mentees who responded to the feedback: 12

The majority of respondents gave strong recommendations to implement the practice of mentorship for students from DEI ready to begin their careers. It has helped them get initial guidance to get oriented in the corporate world and the support from mentors has impacted their performance and stability in their first job in a positive way.
